Parish Notices

<u>New format</u> This is the new format for the Pebble from now on. The new lay out is intended to give more space for news, together with an opportunity for poems or theological material on the front cover which, if possible, will support or further explicate the sermon topic of the day.

Sunday lections From now on the Sunday Scripture readings will be listed on page 2 for your further study at home, but will not be published in the Pebble. The liturgical movement revived the importance of Scripture in the liturgy, and emphasised the priority of a congregation's alert collective listening to the Sunday readings in which a new depth of meaning emerges from the combined attentiveness to the Word of God. Giving the Scripture readings out was discouraged as this invites the congregation to withdraw into a private reading experience in which they are less likely to experience Christ as the living Word present in his body gathered together for worship. There will be a fuller explanation of this change in this morning's parish forum.

Parish Forum A parish forum will follow today's 10.30 Service at which Fr Hugh will talk about some of the ways in which he intends to approach ministry at St Peters. A synopsis of the main points will

appear in next month's Rock for those not at the forum. The Pot Luck luncheon will follow the forum.

American budget woes The Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance of the American Episcopal Church has drawn up a draft budget ahead of the General Convention in 2012 (their equivalent of General Synod) which proposes to cut both programmes and staff from a number of their extra national ministries, together with further reductions at their national headquarters building in New York. A further unpopular measure is the requirement for the dioceses to pay more into the national budget despite a request at the last General Convention that the diocesan share comes down. These budget constraints are in part a reflection of their steady membership decline since the 1970's, but more particularly stem from the internal haemorrhaging of parishes and dioceses as a result of recent controversial changes in the life of the Episcopal Church. Not only have the departing Episcopalians taken their financial contributions with them, but also in many cases expensive litigation has followed as the Episcopal Church has fought through the courts to prevent any exiting parish retaining its plant and property. Not all of the conservatives have gone. At the last General Convention a new grouping emerged - the Anglican Communion Partner movement, which vowed to stay on as a loyal opposition fighting the potentially Communion breaking controversial measures taken at that meeting, but giving their primary loyalty to the Anglican Communion as a whole rather than the national church and its Presiding Bishop. This movement is spearheaded by Bishop Mark Lawrence of the diocese of South Carolina, with the diocese of Central Florida also in strong support. Last year part of the rump core of national church loyalists within the diocese of South Carolina tried to get Bishop Mark Lawrence impeached by the House of Bishops, alleging that he had struck a compromise deal with a departing parish allowing them to keep some of their property, and that he had encouraged the disloyal undermining of the Episcopal Church's polity. The Bishop's committee who investigated the charges decided to step back from such an inflammatory disciplinary measure, but Bishop Mark Lawrence is not out of the woods yet as a recently passed piece of legislation gives greater power to the national executive and the Presiding Bishop to call to order local parts of the Episcopal Church. This is in itself a major departure from the rather decentralised polity of the Episcopal Church as it emerged after the war of independence. So far publicity and conflict has

centred on issues to do with human sexuality, but a more fundamental possible change may well be coming up in the lift at the next General Convention. Progressives want a major revision of the Episcopal Prayer Book to eliminate all Trinitarian language, on the grounds that it is patriarchal and oppressive. Such a change would call into question whether the Episcopal Church was still an orthodox or indeed a Christian Church, and would be highly likely to provoke the kind of outside intervention that they have so far kept at bay. It would also bring in to high relief the Meta issue that lies behind pretty much all the contestation issues in the Anglican Communion at present - the way in which a national church loses its way when it becomes lost in the local, and the erosion of authenticity when a Church ceases to be true to itself and loses its soul. The Anglican Communion will now either chose to be a mutually accountable and interdependent world wide Church (i.e. a Catholic church), or it will spiral down into a loose association of increasingly diverse national churches who only come together for essentially limited and pragmatic purposes.
