The new arrangements for provision of the parish's financial services will be discussed, together with topics arising from the Vicar's Rock article on the rise of New Zealand's retirement population. If time permits there will also be comments on recent developments in the Anglican Communion.

<u>Harvest Festival</u> Harvest Festival will be celebrated next Sunday as the gospel reading from John focuses on the appropriate theme of Christ the true vine. Please bring offerings for harvest Festival to the Church on Saturday.

Pentecost Vigil Service On Saturday evening 26 May, the eve of Pentecost Sunday, there will be a celebration of the Eucharist at 5.30 pm according to the rite of St Basil, incorporating a Vigil of readings similar to the Easter Vigil. This will be followed by a potluck meal in the hall. Pentecost is one of the most important feasts in the Church's year – the Eastern Orthodox would argue that it is on a par with Easter, a conviction the Vicar shares – and this Vigil Service provides an opportunity for deep Scriptural reflection and further teaching on the significance of this high point in the liturgical year. Please let the Vicar know if you would be available to read a lesson at this Service.

Covenant woes Last weekend the Christchurch Diocesan Synod rejected the Anglican Covenant making it virtually certain that the General Synod will also do so when it meets later this year. Indeed the Covenant seems in trouble in a major way since a narrow majority of the dioceses of the Church of England have given it the thumbs down, despite the endorsement of a majority of the Church of England's Bishops. Taken together with Rowan William's impending retirement as Archbishop of Canterbury at the end of the year it seems hard to see how this new Communion structure can come in to existence with its major patron off the scene. It is true that some Provinces have endorsed the Covenant, but none of them are major players in the Communion. However sudden reversals and unexpected developments are the order of the day in Communion affairs now. And the underlying pressures that gave birth to the suggestion of a Covenant have not gone away, namely the proliferating and unchecked diversity within the Communion, and the need for some system of mutual accountability and wider authority in the face of Provinces who go it alone with controversial measures that give offence to others and appear to be major departures from Christian faith and practice. Suppose for instance that John Sentamu, the present Archbishop of York, who is widely tipped to be the front-runner for Rowan's job, moves in to the top slot, and then proceeds to pursue his more conservative agenda on issues of personal morality with energy and determination. He could do this through the existing Communion structures such as the Primates meeting, and if he was unafraid to seek closure and enforce decisions achieved, in contrast to Rowan William's vacillating style, might persuade the GAFCON Primates to come back inside the Lambeth Conference tent, and to pursue their agendas from the centre of Communion structures, rather then seeking to create their own alternative ways of being Anglican on the periphery.

These have now been fitted. To operate depress the switch at the top, then press the button beneath until a blue light comes on.

<u>Vestry news</u> This month's Vestry meeting agreed to accept Danielle Harrison's offer to provide the parishes financial services pro bono. This new system will replace the diocesan provision of financial services which has become increasingly fragile and unsatisfactory, and which is highly likely to attract a service fee in the future. The changeover date will be 1 June 2012. More about this at next Sunday's parish forum.
