Parish News

Reports of our death have been greatly exaggerated At first glance the ODT's Tuesday morning front-page headline seemed to suggest that the Anglican Diocese of Dunedin is in meltdown. But the reality is that the downsizing that is about to take place relates mostly to the Diocesan office and administrative structure. And the parishes that will close are the ones for whom the writing was on the wall anyway. To those who have been following the affairs of the Dunedin diocese for sometime the Bishop's letter will have

come as little surprise. What is unusual is how long it took the media to pick up on it. Perhaps they would have missed it completely if the Bishop hadn't posted it on his blog. The lack of serious investigative journalism that is the norm in this country now may yet shield the Diocese from the kind of searching enquiry that might be expected. The Bishop's letter will be considered by the Vestry at next week's meeting, and will be the subject of our next parish forum, which will be next Sunday. St Peter's is in a strong position to weather the challenges that lie ahead, and may find great opportunities in the developing situation. Assurances have been received that our bequests and trust funds will not be encroached upon by a cash hungry diocese. There are parishes that are strong and growing in the Diocese, and one can't help noticing that they tend to be the ones that have accepted the gospel warts and all, without any deference to contemporary enthusiasms. Our mandate in the years ahead is to be a shining beacon of orthodox Christian faith and welcoming gospel community.

Patronal festival Our Patronal Festival is just two weeks away now. The celebrations will commence with Choral Evensong on Saturday 30 June at 6 pm followed by a potluck meal. Our guest preacher at the Sunday Services will be the Revd Dr James Harding, who is on the staff of All Saints, Dunedin.

Building facts Dunedin diocese has 60 churches and related buildings. More of these are of unreinforced masonry than any other diocese in the country and we have fewer endowments than any other diocese. Public buildings constructed prior to 1976 will have to get engineers to carry out an initial evaluation procedure within 2 years at a cost of \$1,800 to \$4,000. If they are below the safety code they will have either 10 or 15 years, according to their below code rating, to get themselves earthquake strengthened to 67% of code. Vicarages will not be inspected as they are considered to be private dwellings.
