Parish News

Today's sermon The Transfiguration is an embarrassment to those who seek to demythologise the New Testament, and to reduce its supernatural content so as to make its contents acceptable to a sceptical, secular readership. But in fact this is one of the primary disclosure points of the identity of Jesus, the world of glory he came from, to which he invites us.

Praying for the Diocese The Bishop has asked that each parish set time aside over the weekend of 31 August to 2 September to pray in intercession for the Diocese, asking that God's will be known to us in what we should do in the years ahead to meet our present challenging situation.

Accordingly on Saturday 1 September a votive Mass of the Holy Spirit will be celebrated at 10 am, and the Church will be open for prayer throughout the day for parishioners to come and do just that, concluding at 4 pm with Evening Prayer. A roster, divided into half hour slots, is on the foyer noticeboard for us to enter in our prayer time. A note book has been provided in which parishioners can write in suggestions that have arisen from their prayer time as to helpful new courses of action the diocese could take in future years to reform and renew its life.

Clash of religions Some diocesan synod delegates have been dismayed to learn that for the second year running the dates chosen for synod clash with a major rugby game, in this case South Africa playing at the stadium. To add insult to injury the usual synod venue of Holy Cross Mosgiel is unavailable because rugby fans got in ahead of the diocesan manager and booked it out as an accommodation venue. So synod is heading off to St Hilda's, and the diocesan manager has invited synod delegates to "get your head around it."

Financial handover Danielle Harrison has taken over the administration of the parish's financial affairs as of Wednesday 1 August. Her contact details are: 58 Grove Street. Grateful thanks are due to Rita-May Brown for continuing to administer our financial affairs through this transition period, and even more so for being our treasurer link person with the diocesan financial services system over recent years. Parishioners may recall that the increasing fragility of the diocesan financial provider system obliged the parish to consider other alternatives, and so it came to pass the Danielle agreed to do all that for us on a pro bono basis.

<u>Vicar on leave</u> The Vicar will be away on holiday from Tuesday 7 August to Wednesday 15 August. Fr Wiremu will take the St Barnabas Services, and Fr Geoff the Thursday Mass. The celebrant and preacher next Sunday will be Fr Roger Barker.

Size of Synod The Vicar has a motion on the Synod order paper requesting that the Bishop and the Diocesan Council bring proposals to next year's synod to reduce the size of synod in an equitable manner. Although one of the smallest dioceses, Dunedin has as many synod reps as some of the largest, and parallels the numbers of General Synod. This hampers good decision-making, and generates costs the diocese cannot afford. It is also unjust as parishes with small Sunday attendances and negligible financial contributions often have more reps than those with good attendances and major shares of the diocesan budget.

Bequesting Our last opportunity to do good in the world is often through the wise and generous arrangements we make in our wills. What we have in a material or monetary sense came from God in the first place, and we can't take it with us on our return to him. We can however resource our parish church by remembering it in our will. Indeed, our present robust capacity to deal with challenges that will likely drive other parishes to the wall is pretty much dependent on the generosity of past benefactors, who have given us the wherewithal to look present circumstances in the eye with confidence. If we have the foresight and the thoughtfulness to go and do likewise then things will go well for St Peter's in the decades ahead.
