Joc Malcolmson's funeral Joc Malcolmson died on Thursday morning having been ill with cancer for much of the year. She had received the last rites of the Church some days before. Her funeral will be on Monday at 1 pm at Hope's Funeral Chapel.

In this longest liturgical season of the years we focus on a particular gospel, in this case Luke, and make our way through it Sunday by Sunday.

<u>Vestry news</u> It was decided to replace the flourescent lights in the Church with long life bulbs, and to do this ourselves to cut costs. It was noted with concern that the Macey bequest cannot be drawn down any further this year to meet running costs as this would reduce the capital. A stewardship programme will take place in the October/November period. A list of topics were prepared for September's Vestry conversation with the Bishop. Succession planing and possible new growth initiatives were also discussed.

Bishop's Lent road trip Bishop Kelvin has announced that, beginning on March 13, he will travel from one end of the diocese, starting at Stewart Island, and travel by foot (mostly), boat, train and bicycle to Kurow and the Waitaki river at the other end, arriving on Saturday April 13. He will do this as part of the bicentenary events planned to mark Samuel Marsden's first procalamation of the gospel in New Zealand. At each local daily stopping event Bishop Kelvin anticipates holding some small local event at which the good news of Jesus will be shared. Once a week, at various straegic points along the way he intends to host larger, regional gatherings where members of the diocese will join together as witnesses of the gospel. The proposed route covers more than 700 km, of which about 550 will be walked, with the rest being covered by train (the Kingston Flyer and the Tairei Gorge railway) bicycle (The Otago Central Rail Trail) and boat ( the ferry from Stewart Island and the leg from Kingston to Queenstown). Several people have indicated their willingness to walk the entire route with the Bishop.
