<u>Procession</u> The Solemn Eucharist begins with a procession around the church to celebrate the Feast of the Dedication of St John Lateran, the first Christian church in Rome, upon which date we recall the anniversary of the dedication of this Church. Please join in if you are able.

David's lecture On Tuesday evening at 7.30 in the lounge our organist and music director will be giving a presentation on the ways in which a number of his predecessors have been active in the South Dunedin community as agents of cultural enrichment and musical appreciation, thus spreading St Peter's influence beyond the walls of the Church, and acting as gospel leaven in the surrounding suburb. This is the start of a wider research project on which he is about to embark regarding a history of the arts in South Dunedin.

The rest of the Caversham lectures On 19 November Associate Professor John Stenhouse of the Otago history department gives an account of the way in which local Churches acted as the matrix of trade unionism, first wave feminism and much else besides, in what was New Zealand's most advanced industrial suburb entitled. "The social impact of South Dunedin's Churches". On 26 November, "In the Still Centre: Poetry as an act of compassion," David Howard, poet, and this year's Burns fellow for literature, reads a selection of his favourite poems and tells us why he likes them, and what to look for in a poem. Next year the Caversham lectures will feature a series on great Anglo-Catholics of the twentieth century, which will include Dom Gregory-Dix, the liturgist, Austin Farrer, the theologian, and Michael Ramsey, Archbishop of Canterbury.
