<u>Candlemas</u> Today we celebrate the feast of the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple, which ends the season of Epiphany tide. The sermon is entitled "The disciplined search for holiness." As we prepare to process around the Church at the beginning of the 10.30 am Service we bless the candles in this manner:

Priest: May the light and peace of Jesus Christ our Lord be with you.

The Lord bless you.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

He is worthy of all thanksgiving and praise.

Blessed are you, Lord our God, King of the universe! You make our darkness be light. For with you is the well of life and in your light we see light.

Blessed be God forever.

(The Priest blesses the candles, and then says) We wait for your loving kindness, O Lord,

in the midst of your temple.

Open to us the gates of righteousness

that we may enter and give thanks to the Lord.

God is the Lord who has shown us light,

Let us offer in his dwelling an oblation with great gladness.

(The procession then begins)

Flagpole repair Last week the flagpole was blown out of its support cradle by the strong winds. Soon it will have to be replaced by an aluminium pole, which will have a very long life. Currently we are flying the compass rose, the flag of the Anglican Communion.

The Christian Formation Group As Lent begins in early March the Christian Formation Group will begin its life, meeting on Monday nights with a 7 pm Eucharist in the Church, and then adjourning to the Vicarage to study the New Testament Mass readings for the following Sunday, followed by a period of silent prayer which will lead off from those readings, and will conclude with intercessory prayer for the parish. Refreshments will follow. If the life of the group takes root it will continue through the year, though on a fortnightly rather than weekly basis.

What we believe In a small noticeboard at the entrance way to the Church there has been a brief statement of belief dating back to the Fr Carl era entitled, "What we believe." The Vicar has been encouraged to come up with his own version, and this he has now done entitling it instead, "Themes often addressed in the preaching here." In addition to the entranceway noticeboard it has also been posted on the parish web site. Comment and dialogue on this credo is welcome.

Unpacking St Basil On the eve of the feast of Corpus Christi, which will be Saturday 21 June this year, we trace a stage in the evolution of the Eucharist, by celebrating that particular rite and explaining its significance, followed by a meal. This year we will be taking a close look at the liturgy of St Basil, which we celebrate here on special occasions. This will also involve a consideration of the major change that came over Christian worship when Christianity became the official religion of the Roman empire, and the Eucharist was now celebrated in worship halls called at first "basilicas", and then "churches."
