Parish News

<u>Procession</u> Our 10.30 am Service begins with a procession around the Church as we honour the Holy, Blessed and Glorious Trinity. Please feel free to join in.

<u>This morning's sermon</u> is entitled, "What heals us," and and considers the implications of God as Trinity for our life together in Christian community.

<u>Thursday Eucharist</u> The 10 am Thursday Eucharist is celebrated in the Parish Lounge through the Winter months.

<u>Corpus Christi</u> Next Sunday we celebrate the feast of Corpus Christi, in which we thank God for the gift of his risen life in holy communion. As is our custom we will explore the evolution of the

Eucharist through Christian history by celebrating a different Eucharistic liturgy on the preceding Saturday evening at 5.30 pm, followed by a shared meal known as the Agape Banquet, a name deriving from the fact that the Eucharist was at first celebrated in the context of a meal. This year we will celebrate and investigate the Liturgy of St Basil, which is becoming known to us through its use on special occasions here. This will be an opportunity to learn something of the way in which the Eucharistic liturgy developed in a rather different way in the eastern parts of the Roman empire, and so laid the foundations of the Eastern Orthodox approach to worship.

Our Patronal festival will be celebrated on Sunday 29 June. Our guest preacher will be the Revd Eric Kyte, Vicar of St Johns, Roslyn, and Vicar General. The celebrations continue on the Sunday afternoon with drinks at 4 pm in the lounge, followed by Choral Evensong at 5 pm. It would be much appreciated if we could have as many of the parish family as possible at Church that Sunday.

Further reflections on motion 30 from the recent General **Synod** Motion 30 has been widely interpreted by the media as generating an inevitable momentum towards same sex relationship blessings over a 4 year period. If this were to be the case then that opens up the wider issue of the New Zealand Anglican Church's relationship to the Anglican Communion. A decision to bless such relationships would see our church identified with the Episcopal Church of the United States, and the Canadian Church, by the wider Communion. Many African and Asian Provinces would no longer wish to be in communion with us, and there is the possibility that a number of African provinces would no longer wish to receive our missionaries or our mission aid money, as has been the case with missionaries and money from the Episcopal Church. We are now four years away from the next Lambeth Conference in 2018. There are already major question marks as to how many Provinces will actually attend the event, or whether a rival event such as GAFCON will become the rallying point for the majority of the Provinces in the southern hemisphere. Our Bishops may find themselves part of a rather small gathering of what many might perceive as the rapidly dying western churches. The Episcopal Church is now in rapid spiral down as it continues to pursue a self destructive path of identifying with a particular constituency in America's culture wars. It is no longer the brand leader of interesting and useful pastoral practice and spiritual depth. Though desperate for friends, it confers a price tag in terms of wider Communion relationships on its allies and fellow travellers. There is an ecumenical price tag also, since the Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox and Pentecostal churches will have little interest in drawing near to those on this particular pathway. Not a few Anglicans wont be worried by this, since for them local realities are what counts, and they give little thought to what Communion partners care about, but this is amounts to a lack of Catholic imagination, that sense of mutual interdependence and accountability that is an essential part of a healthy doctrine of the Church.
