This film includes footage of Rowan Williams as Archbishop of Canterbury as celebrant and preacher at Walsingham's National Pilgrimage, together with recollections of his first visit to the shrine as a student. Sung Evensong and Benediction will follow the film screening at 5 pm. A light meal of soup and rolls will follow the Service.

Anglican Taonga is the name of the national Anglican internal news magazine. It is edited by the wife of the Vicar of All Saints Dunedin, assisted by Lloyd Ashton, a full time journalist in the North Island. It exists in two formats – a web site which is continually updated with developing news- and when sufficient New Zealand stories have come to hand, it is published as an attractive colour magazine, which is then distributed to parishes in limited numbers. On the plus side Taonga selects many interesting international news stories to post on the web site from a variety of quality newspapers, together with the Church of England's Church Times, and the Anglican Communion's regular email news service. It also covers pretty much all the major events in the life of our national Church, such as General Synod, ordinations of new Bishops, and changes at the national theological college, St John's Auckland. The magazine edition is also attractively laid out with quality photographs. But it is a biased publication, leaning very much to the liberal progressive point of view of its production staff, with little attempt at objectivity. On message commentators, such as Giles Fraser and John Bluck, get lots of space, with inconvenient traditionalist voices omitted. The unspoken assumptions of the magazine are that Anglicanism began when Samuel Marsden arrived in the Bay of Islands in 1814, that the division of our church into three ethnic silos is a thoroughly good thing, and that it is time we got with the programme and followed secular New Zealand in endorsing gay marriage. Taonga is also relentlessly focussed on good news stories, so that bad news stories, such as the recent en masse departure of the parish of Hamilton West, tend not to be mentioned, unless they have become impossible to be ignored, such as the damming report that General Synod received not so long ago about St Johns Auckland. Of course an official publication funded by the General Synod will want to accentuate the positive, but at times the magazine's editorial line tends towards propaganda rather than informing and educating. There is also little in the way of in depth investigation of what is really going on in the Province underneath the surface of things. So Taonga, particularly in the web site format, can be read with interest, but should be taken with a pinch of salt. This writer sometimes wonders if he belongs to, or would wish to join, the Church described in our glossy magazine.
