A difficult letter for difficult people St Paul had spent a year and a half with the newly formed Corinthian Church

working hard to get the message across that their new life in Christ meant a break with the pagan assumptions of their background culture. Now, while on his travels, he is told that they have brought the baggage of their former way of life into their Church life. In his first letter to the Corinthians Paul sets out on that most difficult of tasks, writing a letter of rebuke to difficult people in such a way that they will take on board what he has to say, rather than screwing the letter up and throwing it away. As we reflect on his words of wisdom we learn much about the Advent hope, particularly about its forward looking nature, and its encouragement to drop a nostalgic longing for a past we may be longing to retreat into. Theosophy Centre opens in Hillside road After much local speculation as to the eventual fate of the Fitzroy Hotel it has now reopened dispensing a different kind of spirit as the Dunedin centre of the Theosophy movement. Founded in the 19th century by Madam Blavatsky, a Russian woman with hypnotic staring eyes, it purports to be tolerantly interested in all world religions, with a particular interest in eastern religions, and to be about realising the spiritual potentialities of humankind. In fact it is based on gnosticism, the deeply mistaken set of spiritual beliefs that this evil corrupt world can be escaped into higher spiritual realities through secret knowledge held by an esoteric few. Some branches dabble in spiritualism, others in a weird mimicking of the Tridentine Mass, others are based on a melange of tired New Age ideas. While much of it is the usual nuttiness and nonsense of off beat spiritual movements, there is a sinister undertow to it all, for Madam Blavtsky proclaimed that Satan is not an evil spiritual force but is rather the light bringer (Lucifer in fact means this) and a source of spiritual enlightenment.
