Parish News

<u>Christian World Service Appeal</u> This next week is a final opportunity to make a contribution to the CWS Christmas appeal.

Attendances up at English Cathedrals Statistics just released show an encouraging rise in attendances at English Cathedrals, though with an oblique edge to them since the rise is in mid-week Services (a doubling of numbers over a decade), with Sunday Service numbers being relatively static. Deans put this phenomenon down to the fact that many people live pressured lives with the weekends mortgaged to many rival leisure activities, so that people in this situation welcome the opportunity to attend relatively short mid-day midweek Services. The anonymity of Cathedral Services also means that people can "slide in from the side" without being noticed, or collared to do Church sustaining jobs, as tends to happen at parish churches. Andrew Nunn, Dean of Southwark Cathedral (a Mirfield trained priest) has disputed national headlines that Sundays are inconvenient. "I would be most reluctant to accept that. I think you have to challenge whether going to a DIY store is actually a priority for their lives, or worship...People need to be drawn into the priority of God. If we begin to suggest that Sunday is the same as any other day, I think we are doing a disservice to the God of Easter." Dean Nunn has also pointed to a considerable rise in Sunday attendances at Southwark Cathedral, which he attributed to a focus on welcome, the quality of the liturgy, and an emphasis on inclusivity. Another factor drawing people to Cathedrals is thought to be the opportunity for those burnt out through over-involvement in their parish Church to be a part of what amounts to a recovery ward, in which their needs are met without any demands being made on them.

<u>New Zealand Cathedrals</u> By and large New Zealand Cathedrals are doing relatively well in attendances, with Christchurch's transitional Cathedral averaging around 150 people at the main Sunday Service. Nelson Cathedral has more modest yet respectable Sunday attendances, and is trying something new, with the Dean adding a fourth Service

to the Sunday line up, a children and young person's Service after Evensong, which he leads. Dunedin Cathedral is struggling, both in attendances and in financial self-sufficiency.
