Thanks for the memory David Scoular and the Vicar have resumed filming interviews with parishioners, with four concluded in the past week, as part of compiling an interview archive to resource a future professionally written parish history. It is essential that we retain these personal recollections of the past of St Peers while parishioners are still with us, and their memories fresh. It is hoped to conclude this interview process by the end of the year. Such a "view from below" has become an important tool of historical research, in which documents are no longer the sole source of recalling the past. These interviews will also be used to compile an edited relatively brief film to be shown over the weekend of the 150th anniversary celebrations to be called, "Thanks for the Memory." This interview compilation process dovetails with David Hoskins investigations of past organists and choir directors as agents of cultural enrichment in the surrounding community, and Alex Chisholm's research into the nutritional history of the parish, charting the way in which cooking styles and eating patterns evolved in this ecclesial slice of South Dunedin life over the past 150 years.

Rates The Christchurch Press had an ominous article this last last week about Local Government New Zealand proposing to central government that churches and charities lose their rates exemption, thus raising approximately another \$180 million a year. Councils across New Zealand find themselves in a funding dilemma as they are under pressure both from ratepayers and central government to keep rates down, while at the same time needing to replace ageing infrastructure. Like Henry VIII their eyes turn avariciously to the churches, for which they see "no rational reason why they should be exempt." For a number of financially struggling Dunedin diocese parishes, particularly multi centre ones, this could push them over the edge.
