parishioner of St Peters, who died in Wellington last year, and whose funeral was at St James Lower Hutt, requested that there be a brief memorial Service for him at St Peters when his ashes became available, followed by the interment of his ashes in the family cemetery. This will take place at St Peters on Friday at 10.30 am. St Peters parishioners are most welcome to attend this Service. St Peters has been left a bequest of \$1,000 by the Coxon estate, a reminder of the good parishioners can do to secure the future of the parish when they make their wills.

The troubles of Lord Green Prebendary Green of St Paul's Cathedral is both a prominent former banker and a Church of England priest. For a number of crucial years he was the head of the Hong Kong and Shanghai bank, the second largest bank in the world, based in London. When he left the business world the conservative government gave him the unpaid job of Minister of State for trade and investment, and promoted him to the House of Lords as Baron Green. Justin Welby, Archbishop of Canterbury, was attracted to Stephen Green's interest in the ethics of the business world, and his place on the advisory council for the banking industry, since both share a background in the upper echelons of the business world. With support from the top Lord Green released a recent report to radically change the way the C of E selects and trains its key leaders. All existing Deans and Bishops are to immediately begin mini Masters of Business Administration training, and a talent pool of 150 potentially outstanding future leaders is to be selected and hot house trained for the top slots in the Church. Those who failed to keep up with the intensive training would be culled out. Stage 1 is already being implemented without any debate on it by the General Synod, and the report has attracted criticism for its lack of emphasis on theological or pastoral training, and as an exercise in capture of the church by its professional advisers. Meanwhile HSBC's operations came under critical scrutiny, first in 2005 for money laundering on behalf of drug dealers and sponsors of state terrorism, and now this year when the Panorama investigative television programme broke the story of the bank's Swiss arm assisting over 100,000 wealthy clients in over 200 countries with tax evasion. Lord Green has been accused of either turning a blind eye to these operations, or being asleep at the wheel while in charge of HSBC. He has declined to answer questions on these matters, and has resigned off the advisory council on the banking industry. Justin Welby now ponders what to do as discrediting criticism mounts of the architect of a report he very much wants to see implemented. The Dunedin Diocese Trust Board has recently sold its shares in HSBC.
