<u>150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary connections</u> With the programme for the 150<sup>th</sup> celebrations now in place our attention turns to publicity, with a particular focus on letting former St Peters parishioners now living in other parts of the country know about the weekend. Please let the Vicar know of any such folk, and of course their location and contact details would be very useful.

Saving St Michaels Clyde The last parish bus trip included on its itinerary St Michaels Clyde, one of the highlights of the expedition. Threatened with closure and sale this attractive church has nothing structurally wrong with it, nor is it an earthquake risk. The problem has been attracting a congregation to justify its continued existence. At the 11th hour some concerned individuals have come together to set up a trust to look after the church, and to change its use to a retreat centre, a proposition which the diocese has agreed to. The Revd Louis Hurd-McKee will shift from Warrington to Clyde to oversee and direct this change of use. The Hurd family have been closely involved in the process as the ashes of the Revd Sam Hurd, thought to be one of the servers in the photo grouped around Fr Mortimer in our sacristy, are interred in the St Michaels Columbarium, since he was twice Vicar of the Dunstan parish. The independent trust solution to redundant churches was most famously employed to save Old St Paul's Wellington, the former Cathedral, which now charges astronomical fees as a wedding and funeral venue, which does not seem to deter the many who use it for this purpose. Indeed the trust can afford to employ several people to administer and care for it.
