# **Parish News**

<u>Pentecost procession</u> To honour the feast of Pentecost we begin today's 10.30 am Service with a procession around the Church, which you are most cordially invited to join.

<u>Companion mission link to Revd Jonathan Hicks</u> This week's Vestry meeting decided to forge a companion mission link the Revd Jonathan Hicks, the young American priest who preached at our Patronal Festival in recent times, who will be deploying to the Solomon's in August to teach at the theological college there.

Jonathan received his PhD in Patristics at the Otago Theology department, and he, his wife Tess, and their children had a galvanising effect on the Port Chalmers parish where they lived. The link means that we will be in regular touch with them as a family, will pray for them, and will receive deputation visits from them every two to three years. \$1,500 from parish funds will be sent to the Church Missionary Society each year to support them, with another \$500 being provided by individual parishioners as parish mission companions. The Vicar has already signed up to this, and invites parishioners to join him by letting him know of their willingness to do this also.

The early bird registration (by 1 August) cost is \$35 a head, or \$40 if by 1 September. The charge can be waived if the expense is an issue. We want all parishioners to be with us for the celebrations.

The fighting late fifties Boko Haram have become notorious for their kidnapping of young Nigerian Christian women to make them their slaves, and to forcibly convert them to Islam. The ineffectiveness of the Nigerian army and the compromised nature of much of the Nigerian political establishment meant that little was done to redeem the situation. An international outcry for someone to "do something" dodged the hard issue that this must mean western powers committing Special Forces units to confront Boko Haram. Now the situation has changed with Boko Harm driven from a number of its secure areas, and the rescue of many of the captives. As an extraordinary story in the Guardian Weekly reveals the x factor has been the employment of South African mercenaries, most of whom are in their late 50's or early 60's, who are both highly experienced and battle hardened, and who are used from South Africa's former border wars to fighting alongside black African troops as their comrades in arms. Though age inhibits them from the more agile roles at the forward edge of the battle area their command abilities and firepower skills are decisive. Though well paid for what they do they face the penalty of being barred by their own government from returning to South Africa.
