This will be our main Service of the day in the style of the 10.30 am Sung Eucharist, with the Vicar being the preacher. He will also be the chaplain to the Synod. The parish will then host the Synod breakfast. Typically the Service is attended by around 100 people.

He is promoting a fundraiser on their behalf on Wednesday 1 July, which is the film "Still Life" at the Rialto at 7.45 pm, with a suggested donation of \$18. New Zealand's refugee policy Last Sunday the Vicar attended a meeting convened by Fr Gerard Aynsley, the local Catholic priest, on the subject of the refugee crisis, which is now such a recurring item on our news bulletins. The invitation appeared to be aimed at local clergy but few of them were there, with the reasonably large attendance made up in the main of catholic parishioners from what they call the southern pastoral region. The feeling of the meeting was that New Zealand's current policy of only selecting 750 refugees a year for resettlement was mean spirited and insufficient. A Dutch woman pointed out that Holland, though only about the size of Canterbury, accepts 25,000 refugee immigrants a year. Apparently Dunedin had made a large hearted response in sponsoring and supporting Kampuchean refugees a while ago when Cambodia was high on the world's register of traumatic events. A consensus appeared to be that politicians were more likely to make a generous response if local people made an offer of support and hospitality to get recent arrivals settled. The meeting decided to reconvene in two or three weeks' time to continue to strategise around this possibility. The current minister of immigration is of course local MP Michael Woodhouse, who is a practising catholic.
