TEC General Convention The Episcopal Church's General Convention in Salt Lake City has now drawn to a close. The Convention elected an Afro-American, Michael Curry, Bishop of North Carolina, as its new Presiding Bishop, the first time an Afro-American has held this office. It redefined marriage, and authorised two new marriage rites applicable to both heterosexual and same-sex couples. The Archbishop of Canterbury has responded with a communique expressing "deep concern about the stress for the Anglican Communion following the US Episcopal Church's House of Bishop's resolution to change the definition of marriage in the canons so that any reference to marriage as between a man and a woman is removed." So far so predictable. Then came an extraordinary speech from a deputy for the diocese of Olympia who reported that she has cohabited with her boyfriend for the past six years, that despite the persuasive efforts of friends and family she has no intention of marrying or having children, and that she "feels that the church's silence about such relationships is passive judgement." It was surprising enough that a person in such a state of life should be both a General Convention deputy and a Sunday School teacher as she is, but to then have the brass neck to commend her way of life as acceptable and deserving of church approval was remarkable. Such a speech provides a snap shot of the extent to which the Episcopal Church has complacently accepted the norms and outcomes of the sexual revolution as it has worked its way through western culture. The issue for them is no longer what does God want and expect of Christians in intimate relationships, but rather how can the church validate a variety of what were formerly seen as irregular relationships as normative and approved, as secular society does. The Episcopal Church is taking its bearings from a surrounding culture and social order that is less and less influenced by the gospel, and is thereby diminishing the power of the gospel to order and renew its life.
