Festival of Flowers The Church and the Lounge are transformed this morning by Faye-Noel and the Dunedin Floral Art Society who have decorated our sacred space to a very appropriate theme – St Peter the fisherman. We are very grateful to Faye-Noel and her team for all the hard work that has gone in to this lovely display, which has drawn an appreciative public to our Church. This is the

second year that St Peters has hosted the Spring Floral Arts Festival.

Ambitious, Power Hungry, Status Seekers need not apply This morning's sermon focuses on the extraordinary request of James and John for foremost positions in the Kingdom that Jesus is about to inaugurate. Mark's gospel makes it clear that despite the impending tragic events of Gethsemane and Golgotha the innermost circle of the Jesus movement has not grasped what is expected of spiritual leaders in the community of those who follow Jesus. This remains a live issue for the Church today as it seeks to get the best out of its potential leadership pool while at the same time inculcating in them the spirit of costly service and counter cultural living that ignores the very human desire for status and prestige as a reward for services rendered. The Church needs motivated and effective leaders who will at the same time exercise power and authority with a light touch, a kind spirit, and a humble awareness of their own limitations. They must be bold and brave, not afraid of conflict and difficulties, but also be humble of heart and focused on living the gospel of servant leadership.

The rest of the year in prospect:

- The Caversham lectures run throughout November, beginning with God, the Devil and the Demon Drink on Tuesday 3 November in which Associate Professor John Stenhouse explores the connection between Dunedin's churches, first wave feminists and the movement for Prohibition. Dunedin's Warehouse Precinct is the theme of Associate Professor Alex Trapeznik's lecture on 10 November, with Emeritus Professor Blair Fitzharris giving a presentation on 17 November on the potential vulnerability of South Dunedin to coastal flooding and ocean inundation. Then on 24 November David Hoskins will speak on the use successive NZ Government's made of the New Zealand Film Unit documentaries to develop a mythology of nation. These lectures will begin at 7.30 pm in the parish lounge.
- On Sunday 29 November, the first Sunday in Advent, there will be a Service at 5 pm based around John Donne's **La Corona** sequence of poems presenting a Marian perspective on the main events of Christ's life, with music in a Jacobean mode.
