<u>Frances Hodgkins</u> The Vicar will celebrate the Eucharist at Frances Hodgkins on Thursday at 11 am. He will celebrate again at the same time and place the following week. This unusual celebration pattern is because of the Vicar's recent holiday.

All on board The Global South Anglican Primates meeting in Cairo recently have agreed to attend the Archbishop of Canterbury's special meeting of Primates at Canterbury in January. They were pleased that Justin Welby had attended their meeting, and had promised to allow participants to be the suggesters of agenda items for the January meeting. This bodes well for the New Year gathering as a boycott by the disaffected and most numerous Anglican provinces would have considerably lessened its value. **Drop the Filioque** An important ecumenical milestone has been achieved by the Anglican Oriental Orthodox International Commission at its recent meeting in Wales where it reached a joint agreement on its understanding of Christ's person, what is known as Christology. The Oriental Orthodox churches are those Middle Eastern churches, such as the Coptic Church, which could not agree with the theological understandings reached at the Council of Chalcedon in 451, and broke away to pursue an independent path. For a thousand years they were the leading edge of Christian evangelism, but a number of these churches are now being extinguished by Islamic terrorism in Iraq and neighbouring countries. In a further agreement the Anglican participants have agreed to recommend that Anglicans drop the filioque clause from the Nicene Creed ("We believe in the Holy Spirit...who proceeds from the Father and the Son) which is said at our Services Sunday by Sunday. This is a late addition to the creed inserted by the western church without any sanction from an ecumenical Council, and which has become widely perceived to reduce the theological significance of the Holy Spirit. St Peters omits the filioque clause at our 10.30 am Service in accord with a number of major theological ecumenical agreements between Anglicanism and Orthodoxy. The rest of the year in prospect:

- The Caversham lectures run throughout November, beginning with God, the Devil and the Demon Drink on Tuesday 3 November in which Associate Professor John Stenhouse explores the connection between Dunedin's churches, first wave feminists and the movement for Prohibition. Dunedin's Warehouse **Precinct** is the theme of Associate Professor Alex Trapeznik's lecture on 10 November, with Emeritus Professor Blair Fitzharris giving a presentation on 17 November on the potential vulnerability of South Dunedin to coastal flooding and ocean inundation. Then on 24 November David Hoskins will speak on the use successive NZ Government's made of the New Zealand Film Unit documentaries to develop a mythology of nation. These lectures will begin at 7.30 pm in the parish lounge.
- On Sunday 29 November, the first Sunday in Advent, there will be a Service at 5 pm based around John Donne's La Corona sequence of poems presenting a Marian perspective on the main events of Christ's life, with music in a Jacobean mode.
