What happened in Rome? The three week Synod of Bishops meeting on the theme of the family has concluded with secular journalists puzzled about the outcome. Nothing was said about gay relationships, and while the final document counselled a spirit of welcome and inclusion for divorced and remarried Catholics the rules weren't changed about allowing them back to communion. Observers wondered too about the opening restatement of traditional church teaching on moral issues from an Eastern European Cardinal as an apparent agenda setter. However the final 93 paragraph statement isn't the point of real significance about the gathering; rather the spirit of consultation, open dialogue and careful mutual listening to other points of view is the startling change brought about by Pope Francis. This has been unsettling and concerning for those prelates accustomed to tightly controlled Synods and centrally tailored take home messages of an expected sort. What is happening is the restoration of what the Synods of Bishops were supposed to be at their inception at the Vatican 2 Council - a raising in value of the local church vis a vis the universal church, a moving away from a Eurocentric dominated church, and an opportunity for dialogue of weight and significance in the higher counsels of the church. This genuine collegiality was hindered and impeded by John Paul 2 and Benedict, but has now gained momentum under the new leadership. Now the emphasis is on the Pastoral aspect of the church, with Pope Francis using the striking image of the church as a field hospital. As the wounded of the world stream in priests and bishops are to receive them with compassion, understanding, warmth and welcome, intent on healing and restoring those who have come for solace and understanding. The church is not to sell Christ's demanding life style requirements short, nor are priests to be hard hearted disciplinarians and repeaters of tired old nostrums.
