Parish News

<u>Procession</u> Our 10.30 am Service begins with a procession around the interior of the church to honour the Epiphany as one of the premier post-Christmas feasts. Please feel free to join the procession.

Evensong and Benediction As this is the first Sunday in the month the Service of Evensong and Benediction will take place at 5 pm.

Underwhelming Christchurch Cathedral announcement The Christchurch Press had been playing up the pre-Christmas announcement about the future of the Cathedral as a "decision" but in fact it was much more tentative than that. All that the government mediator achieved was to persuade the Church Property Trustees to consider the possibility of reinstating the original Cathedral, while at the same time getting both sides to agree that the likely cost of doing so would be around \$105 million with a likely completion date around 2022. CPT says its insurance pay-out is nowhere near that figure so this puts the onus on the restorationists to come up with the promise of tens of millions of dollars by April. If they cannot do this then the option of demolition and modern replacement becomes the option that will be pursued. Gerry Brownlee conceded that state financial help was a possibility, but this could be tricky with secularists objecting to tax payer money being spent on such a project and Catholics enquiring why their Cathedral was not receiving the same assistance.

Next Sunday we celebrate the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. The revision of the liturgical calendar in recent years has encouraged the Church to see Christmas, Epiphany and the Baptism of the Lord as part of an integrated and extended cycle of Scriptural and Eucharistic reflection on the entire mystery of the Incarnation, and its saving implications for us.

Some anticipations of 2016 In January Justin Welby Archbishop of Canterbury will gather the Primates of the Anglican Communion around him at Lambeth to see if a way forward can be found to keep the Communion together in the face of divisive quarrels around issues of human sexuality. In May the New Zealand General Synod will meet at Napier. Amongst other issues it will consider the preliminary report of the Way Forward group tasked with bringing forward proposals for implementing Motion 30 of the last General Synod on same sex blessings. The Way Forward task group failed to bring this report together in time for last year's Diocesan Synods to consider it as it should have, and so a vexed issue will be whether this preliminary round of consultations can be dispensed with, or whether the whole process should be slowed down by two years to allow such a consultation to proceed. The Diocesan Synod will meet in Invercargill 16-18 September. Lent and Holy Week fall early in the coming year with Ash Wednesday occurring on 10 February and Easter on 27 March. 2016 will be Bishop Kelvin's last full year as Bishop of Dunedin as he is due to retire at Easter 2017 when he turns 65.

<u>Documentary film season planned</u> A season of documentary films will be included in the 2016 cycle of parish events. These will include *Best of Enemies* about the 1968 series of television debates between Gore Vidal and William Buckley Junior at the time of the Republican and Democratic political conventions, *Red Army* about the Red Army Ice Hockey Team, world champions whose fortunes mirrored the rapid social and cultural changes in Russia, *The Salt of the Earth* about Sebastiao Salgado one of the world's great social photographers, *From Scotland with Love*, and excerpts from *The World's Great Churches*. These will include the painted churches of Romania and the Cathedral of Monreale in Sicily. The film season has yet to be timetabled.
