<u>The Ordinariate</u> When Pope Benedict created the Ordinariate to receive Anglicans bailing out over changes in the C of E into Catholic ecclesial life with an Anglo-Catholic tinge there was an initial wave of new recruits that then ebbed to very few. Now in a strange twist the Ordinariate parishes are growing as result of Catholic recruits, either the lapsed returning or practising Catholics who prefer the more formal liturgical style of this new phenomenon.

Episcopalians will be at ACC in Lusaka Justin Welby's apparent success at the January Primates' meeting in keeping the Communion together is coming under serious strain as the Episcopalian members of the Anglican Consultative Council have made it clear that they intend to turn up at the next meeting in Lusaka in April and exercise their voting privileges claiming that the Primates have no authority to prevent them doing so. This is one of the representative bodies that the Episcopal Church is supposed to be taking a break from over the next three years as a consequence of their proposed changes to their marriage canons. However this always depended upon the Episcopal Church voluntarily accepting their restrictions. Already the Ugandan Church has given notice it will not attend the ACC meeting. Further reaction from the Global South Provinces may well now follow as they will say that as usual the Americans just ignore any disciplinary action against them, and forge ahead as though they have no mutual responsibility obligations.

New Dean for the Taranaki It was announced in the past week that Peter Beck will come out of his early retirement to become the new Dean of Taranaki. His fund raising expertise, so ably demonstrated at St Matthews in the City, Auckland, and then at the former Christchurch Cathedral, will be very useful in seeking the substantial funding required to earthquake proof and restore to full liturgical functioning the pro-Cathedral of St Mary's, New Plymouth that was raised to Cathedral status in recent years. Archbishop Phillip Richardson and Peter Beck are well known to one another and this cordial relationship will also be of value in this new beginning. The St Mary's congregation is presently worshipping in their hall. The Taranaki is a subset region of the Diocese of Waikato.
