What happens in the Eucharist

Worship is an encounter with events. The gospel is about unique events through which the human situation has been changed. Holy Cross St Kilda to be sold Our neighbouring Anglican Church of Holy Cross St Kilda is soon to be sold by tender. It ceased to be used for worship several years ago when an engineering assessment found it to be well below earthquake safety standards, and Holy Cross parishioners have been worshipping in the nearby hall since. Marketing will commence once the goods stored inside are removed and when the Church has been de-consecrated sometime in June. St Peter's originally caused the Church to be built as a mission Church and Chapel of ease just before the First World War, and then permitted the parish to begin its independent existence in 1917.

Teschemakers expedition A parish outing to Teschemakers is planned for Saturday 1 October. Mass will be celebrated in the wonderful Chapel, lunch will follow on site at a cost of \$25 a head, there will be a tour, and then we will adjourn to the Victorian Warehouse Precinct of Oamaru. Parish history Amongst background research reading which the Vicar is undertaking as part of the beginning research on the parish history is Grace Bateman's 2013 PhD Thesis "Signs and Graces: Remembering Religion in Childhood in Southern Dunedin, 1920-1950", examining the meanings of everyday experiences of religion for children in southern Dunedin. Not a few of the people interviewed for the study attended St Peter's Caversham in their younger days, though their identities are protected by pseudonymous names in the thesis. If you are one of them, and wouldn't mind doing so, please let the Vicar know. It is surprising in this secular age how many Otago PhD theses have religious themes.
