The Sundays in Ordinary Time

In the Sundays in Ordinary Time the liturgical colour changes to green as we remember God's goodness to us in creation, the way he sustains it in being, and brings a perpetual freshness to it. The readings settle in to a regular rhythm focussing at present on Isaiah, 1 Corinthians and of course Matthew, the gospel of choice in Year A. Matthew presents Jesus as the second Moses, the one who fulfils the prophecies of the Old Testament, and whose mission is to renew the covenant between God and his people. This gospel records much of the teaching of Jesus in contrast to Mark who concentrates on the doing/acting aspect of the ministry of Jesus and is somewhat sparse about his teaching. Today's sermon is entitled "Why Geography Matters," and explains why the Galilean background of Jesus is useful in understanding his ministry.

Five Unusual Documentaries Our season of documentaries begins tomorrow night 23 January with Genius Within: The Inner Life of Glenn Gould: Canadian pianist Glenn Gould came to the music world's attention with his innovative version of the Goldberg Variations and then gave away his famed concert performance career to concentrate on his recordings. Former films about him have either emphasised his eccentricities or have been hagiographical accounts of his continuing impact on audiences after his comparatively

early death. This film gets to the truth of the man and the musician, a story sadder, more human and more interesting than any yet told of the previous documentaries made about him. This will be in the Vicarage at 7pm.

Next week on Monday 30 January we screen Lo and behold: Reveries of the Connected World: Veteran documentarian Werner Herzog brings his boundless curiosity and ironic humour to this account of how the digital world and cyberspace came to be and its extraordinary reach throughout our world. Though he doesn't own a cell phone and only uses e mail his IT naiveté becomes a plus as he deploys his boundless curiosity and ironic humour to consider how the Internet might have developed and where the digital world might be going in terms of possibilities such as robotics and space travel.

Epiphany Carol Service Next year we will have an Epiphany Carol Service modelled on the style of our Nine Lessons and Carols Service in the 10.30 am slot concluding with communion. This will give us an opportunity to sing many of the Epiphany carols that are often overlooked as we briefly pass over this important festival together with a variety of Old Testament readings that are fitting companions to them. The Eucharistic Prayer that will be used has been specially written for such an occasion by the Vicar of St Martin in the Fields London.
