It would be very much appreciated if parishioners could reach out to the wider circle of the parish family to let them know about our big Service on Sunday 24 September at which the newly ordained Bishop Steve Benford will celebrate and preach at the 10.30 am Parish Eucharist. Word of mouth will be the best way of ensuring the best possible attendance at this highlight of the parish year.

Christchurch Cathedral decision Last weekend's Christchurch diocesan Synod decision was achieved by a narrow majority with the Synod reluctantly forgoing its original decision to build a modern, safe, and inspiring fit for purpose Cathedral. What swayed Synod members in the end was the increased cash offer from the government and a desire to repair the relationship with the city after the 7 year polarising debate. However, some hard bargaining will now ensue over the details of the rebuild. The Church Property Trustees and the Cathedral leadership would like to see some flexibility over three features of the restored Cathedral, a more open and welcoming entrance way as opposed to the small house like structure that formerly enclosed the main western entrance, a reduction in the size of the large stone pillars that reduced the sight lines to the sanctuary and the altar and a desire for a level floor throughout the Cathedral. The restorationists have made much of their ability to fund raise large sums from generous philanthropic donors. Their credibility is now on the line as they seek to prove what they promised. The insurance bill for the restored Cathedral is estimated to be \$360,000 a year. It is a stipulation of the fund raising that a sufficient sum be set aside for its investment income to meet the bill. Thus much remains to be done to work through these details and to raise the sums involved. However the diocese of Christchurch will no doubt heave a sigh of relief that it can now get on to other and more pressing priorities in its life.
