<u>Second Caversham lecture cancelled</u> Regrettably next week's Caversham lecture entitled "Opening the mind – confessions of a brain surgeon" has had to be cancelled due to illness of the lecturer.

"Wrongful Conviction" This means that the next Caversham lecture will be in a fortnight's time on Tuesday evening 21 November at 7.30 pm when Dr Rachel Zajac explains how courts and the police can sometimes get it wrong in criminal prosecutions. Rachel is an expert in forensic psychology and is often required to give expert testimony in court cases.

Next Sunday we will welcome the Revd Jonathan Hicks as our guest preacher as we celebrate St Peter's Feast of Dedication. Jonathan teaches theology at the Anglican theological college on the island of Malaita in the Solomons. St Peter's provides financial support for this valuable missionary ministry.

The shell diocese of San Joaquin When American clergyman David Rice arrived in New Zealand his rise was meteoric. He

went from being Vicar of Diamond Harbour to Dean of Dunedin and then Bishop of Waiapu. Then he returned to America to become provisional Bishop of the diocese of San Joaquin, or rather what was left of it since most of it had decamped to the Anglican Church of North America over the bitter disputes over human sexuality. Just how precarious and diminished the shell diocese is became clear recently when the executive council of the Episcopal Church forgave San Joaquin nearly \$6 million in loans and interest, costs incurred through litigation to recover former church property and unpaid annual assessments to the national church. There are only 21 viable congregations left in the diocese only 2 of which can afford full time priests. The rest are staffed by retired or part time clergy. The diocese plans to sell 25 buildings recovered through litigation, though some of them need considerable maintenance and repair spending. Similar scenarios are unfolding in the other breakaway dioceses of Forth Worth, South Carolina, and Pittsburgh. Since 2000 the Episcopal Church has spent \$45 million in similar lawsuits with another \$15 million being spent by various dioceses, a lawyers' feast. At the end of these pointless and unchristian exercises the recovered church buildings have often being sold to pay the lawyers bills.
