Churches and Ecclesial Communities Separated from the Roman Apostolic See

We now turn our attention to the two main kinds of rending which have damaged the seamless robe of Christ.

The first divisions occurred in the East, either because of disputes over the dogmatic pronouncements of the Councils of Ephesus and Chalcedon, or later by the breakdown of ecclesiastical communion between the Eastern Patriarchates and the Roman See.

Still other divisions arose in the West more than four centuries afterwards. These stemmed from a series of happenings commonly referred to as the Reformation. As a result, many Communions, national or denominational, were separated from the Roman See. Among those in which some Catholic traditions and institutions continue to exist, the Anglican Communion occupies a special place.

Vision for 100 new churches in London Often these days we hear of churches being closed and demolished. The Diocese of London however is in growth mode and has just opened the first purpose built church in 40 years. In 2011 Tottenham Hale in north London was at the centre of riots, arson attacks and looting. Two years later planning began for the new St Francis in the engine room which is both a worship centre and an important community gathering point for pop up cafes and the Make Lunch project designed to tackle food poverty in the area. In similar vein planners have given consent for the 1970's Holy Trinity Church in Swiss Cottage to be demolished and be replaced by a new 11 million pound complex including a 450 seat auditorium, recording studio and accommodation for vulnerable young people. This is part of ambitious plans to see 100 new Christian communities planted in the diocese, which covers the part of London situated north of the Thames. Last month a 600 clergy "London Clergy Summit" met to plan and pray about a goal to increase the number of new ordinands by 50% over the next 3 years and to plant new Christian communities across the city. Increasingly the nation and the Church of England have become focussed on London and the South East with northern England and parts of the Midlands feeling left out in the cold. Clergy recruitment in the run down sink hole estates of northern England is a major problem, a concern often highlighted by Anglo-Catholicism's bright and shining star Bishop Philip North.
