No pot luck in January While the rhythm of parish life continues pretty much as usual throughout January one missing item in the usual line up of events will be

the pot luck lunch that usually occurs on the second Sunday of the month, i.e. this Sunday.

<u>A note about the parish film season</u> Overleaf you will find details of the beginning of the year film season. What is not listed are two screenings that will occur in Holy Week of Alec McCowen's remarkable solo performance of Mark's Gospel. He memorised the gospel to script his performance. So compelling is the performance that the viewer is almost unaware that he is using the King James version of the Bible as his text. First performed in 1977 in Newcastle, England it became a long running hit that was filmed by the BBC. This version is of a New York stage performance. The two parts will be shown in Holy Week over the evenings of Tuesday 27 March and Wednesday 28 March immediately after the evening Mass. Please note that Easter falls early this year on Sunday 1 April.

<u>Summer Film Season</u> As is our custom we begin the year with a season of films shown in the Vicarage on Wednesday evenings at 7.30 pm. This year's films are: A Month of Sundays – 17 January. Anthony La Paglia teams up with Kiwi comedic icon John Clarke in a brilliantly funny and heart-warming film about a real estate agent who is not coping with his marriage break up and recent difficulties in selling houses. Then he receives a phone call from his mother – who died a year ago!

Still Life – 24 January. Eddie Marsan stars in the deeply affecting tale of a Council employee who tries to trace the relatives of those who have died alone, and who often ends up arranging their funerals. His pending redundancy and last case of a near neighbour and war veteran bring things to a head in his understated and low wattage relational life. A film about respect for the dead.

The Big Short – 31 January. Just before the crash of the American property market that signalled the beginning of the 2008 global financial crisis three different and unrelated groups of individuals anticipated the bursting of the property bubble and bet against the banks that this would happen. A fascinating, entertaining and informative story, and one of the best explanations of why the global financial crisis happened. **City of Gold (seek and devour)** – 7 February. A documentary about Los Angeles food critic Jonathan Gold whose endless search for new food experiences focuses on little known and undiscovered ethnic restaurants and food trucks while eschewing famous top of the line restaurants. Insights are offered into one of the most ethnically and culinary diverse cities of the world but also shows Gold's power to make or break culinary reputations.
