An unfashionable view of Anzac day Although very interested in military history this observer has long been puzzled by the fuss New Zealand makes of ANZAC day, a military disaster badly planned and poorly executed with little to be proud of. By contrast the battles of Messines in 1917 and Bapaume in 1918 were triumphs of New Zealand arms showing what could be done when tactical skill and effective leadership came together in lessons learned from bitter experience on the western front. The western front was always the theatre of operations where the outcome of the Great War would be decided. Attempts at finding easy victories at low cost on the peripheries of the conflict, the recurring futile Winston Churchill search for the enemies' soft underbelly in both world wars, were a waste of time and precious human resources. New Zealand's willingness to go along with these fruitless campaigns would not serve it well or reflect much credit on its political leadership. Decades later the Italian campaign of World War 2 would repeat these lessons as a numerically inferior German force with the terrain on its side would tie up larger allied armies and repeatedly blunt their attempts at outflanking initiatives. At war's end the allied armies were still on Italian soil. Perhaps the reason for the growing popularity of Anzac day is the reality that Waitangi day has really not resonated with the generality of the public or become a national unifying symbol. ANZAC day has become that by default. The other reality is that history is now little taught in NZ secondary schools leaving our young people vulnerable to little understood national myths.
