Frances Hodgkins Service The Anglican Eucharist will be celebrated at Frances Hodgkins on Thursday at 11 am. **Euthanasia bill** It is dismaying news that the Seymour end of life bill received its second reading in the house this past week, another indication of the extent to which New Zealand society has turned its back on God. Our local MP voted in favour of the bill, something for Christians to bear in mind at the next election. The bill will now face a stormy amendment process due to its inadequate safeguarding provisions and wide ranging life termination allowances. It will be important for Christians to mobilise at the time of the third reading of the bill to let MPs know of their opposition to it.

Some significant facts about the building of the second St Peter's in 1882 A new Vicar, the Revd William Ronaldson, instituted in 1881, drove the rebuild project. He pointed out that the increasing population of the suburb was located mostly in Parkside so the new church needed to move away from the site of the first St Peter's, a wooden church built in 1864, just above South Road. Bishop Nevill gave three clear warnings that the new church should be built in wood to keep costs down and to give options about future more permanent structures but the building committee ignored these strong suggestions and built in brick, perhaps because there was a brickworks nearby. The building committee fell out with the architect Thomas Hardy and with the building contractor over the lack of sufficient foundations in the west wall and concerns about the tower. They called for a second opinion from Petre, the architect who built St Joseph's Cathedral, who pointed out the west wall was on a lean and that the bell tower was leaning in towards the nave by 6 inches, and who recommended that the parish not build the spire on top of the bell tower that was part of the original design. The issue went to arbitration and the parish was awarded 250 pounds. A hall and Sunday School was erected on site from redundant school buildings moved from Green Island. Several optimistic assumptions about the financing of the project turned out to be unfounded and the parish went in to debt to a considerable extent. This forced the resignation of Ronaldson in 1887.
