The ordination of Steve Maina as Bishop of Nelson The ordination Service that Fr Hugh attended last Saturday in Nelson was something of a marathon lasting for two and a half hours, though of course it included the installation of the new Bishop in his Cathedral. A powerful sermon was preached by Bishop Oscar Muriu of the Nairobi Chapel, one of the best heard at an episcopal ordination for some time, and one that may have made some of the more liberally inclined NZ bishops squirm. Most of the NZ bishops were there, including our own Steve Benford, and surprisingly one of the suffragan bishops of Sydney. There were the expected Kenyan action songs and ululating together with lots of choruses from the All Saints, Nelson praise band, which tended to intrude itself into the liturgy unnecessarily. It was good to see both the Mayor and the local MP, Nick Smith, go up for communion. After the Service the Nelson brass band lead the dignitaries and the congregation down the main street, with the traffic being stopped, to the after match function at the Trafalgar Centre. Nelson is proud of its Cathedral, which has given this small urban settlement city status from way back. On Sunday morning Bishop Steve Maina preached an excellent and inspiring sermon at the Choral Eucharist to a packed Cathedral congregation. Amongst the oddities of the clergy procession at the ordination Service was a clergyman with an orange stole, a liturgical colour never before seen, and an elderly Maori woman priest wearing a Spike Milligan hat with a black tassel. Engaging her in conversation afterwards she told me that she wears it to show that she is under the Lord's authority. I told her that I wear my biretta in processions for roughly the same reason.
