## Fr Hugh's Opinion Page

Campus life in 2019 The recent death of a Canterbury university student whose decomposed body was undiscovered for several weeks in a hall of residence and the more recent death of an Otago student at an overcrowded Dundas St flat party raises questions about the quality and nature of contemporary student life. Universities have more students attending than ever before yet there is less of a sense of community amongst the student body than formerly. Often students live a more isolated life since much of their scholarly endeavours are on line with even lecture attendance being sometimes an optional extra since these too can often be accessed on one's laptop. Halls of residence used to provide a sense of community and belonging but nowadays students often move out to flats after their first year so there is less of a sense of continuity flowing on from those who have stayed several years. Otago has created a rod for its own back with the city and the university allowing a student ghetto to emerge in the immediate vicinity of the campus. It looks like a slum and no amount of security cameras or campus watch personnel can prevent the lords of misrule from spontaneously and quickly starting public disorder incidents. It will be difficult to encourage other kinds of residents back into this area as landlords can outbid the usual run of homebuyers on any properties that come up for sale. Although student loans and student debt are big issues they also mean that students have more disposable income than formerly and can afford the drinking bouts that cause such concern.
