Epiphany

The Birth of Jesus in Matthew's Infancy Narrative

Like Luke's account of Jesus' birth, Matthew's account is also sparse, giving no information other than the historical time and geographic place...Nevertheless, it situates the event within time and history and thus outside the realm of mythology. Matthew is more interested in making known those who first recognised the significance of Jesus' birth...The principal actors are not Jews but wise men from the East. All that takes place revolves around them and in reaction to their presence. All that they do is focused on Jesus – the prophetic revealing of who he is. Fascinatingly, Matthew traced Jesus' linage back to Abraham, the father of the Jewish people, and so he is unlike Luke, who traced it back to "the Gentile" Adam. Yet Matthew, unlike Luke's Jewish Shepherds, has the non-Jewish wise men from the East as the first seekers of Jesus. Even though the wise men are not of Abraham's seed, they are already experiencing the promised blessings that flow from him to all nations. And unlike the poor and uneducated Jewish shepherds, these gentiles are rich and educated. Both Matthew and Luke, each in their own unique manner, perceive that Jesus is of ultimate significance to both Jew and Gentile, whether poor and uneducated or rich and learned.

Liquid blessing from the sky Members of the Catholic parish of Cow Island, Louisiana have thought up a novel way to bring a blessing to their rural neighbours. Hiring a crop duster aeroplane they requested that its tanks be thoroughly cleansed of any chemicals from prior use, then filled it with 100 gallons of water, had their priest bless this to turn it into holy water and had this special load sprayed over the neighbouring farms. The parish church, a school and other important places in Cow Island received a light spray. Farms in this area grow wheat, rice and sugar cane and also farm crayfish around Thanksgiving. This was done on 21 December, a time when priests traditionally bless farmlands in southern Louisiana. The 70 parishioners who got in behind the project intend to make this an annual event. The crop dusting firm gave its time and services as a donation.

The rise of South Korea's mega-churches The spread of Christianity throughout South Korean society has been one of the most encouraging facets of resurgent Asian Christianity. In the era of military dictatorship the churches were seen as one of the few non-corrupt institutions and defenders of human rights. But now the mainline denominations are being eclipsed by mega-churches that promote prosperity theology - believe in the Christian God and you will become rich and successful. In part this is a reflection of the aspirations of young South Koreans. They are not interested in the ardent desire of their parents for the reunification of the country. The pursuit of comfort, pleasure and material prosperity in a highly individualised world view are their priorities. The mainline churches have a hard but truer message to sell -community matters and the God and father of our Lord Jesus Christ didn't promise us a rose garden.
