PARISH NEWS

<u>The St Peter's filmed weekly Mass</u> Each week a St Peter's Eucharist is filmed and then posted on the parish website so that parishioners can view it on Sunday and make an act of spiritual communion in concert with what they see. The Vicar also posts a weekly personal message on the website.

No more canoodling in dark corners please Research into the parish history has revealed an interesting report in a June 1970 parish magazine about an anguished Vestry meeting grappling with the issue of "Teen-Age Dances." It was decided that more lighting needed to be installed in the entrance, hall and cloak rooms of the parish hall. Alcohol was to be strictly banned and canoodling in the dark corners was to be discouraged. The noise level was to be reduced. Vestrymen were to be on duty at the dances and ladies were to be present as chaperones.

<u>Our Lady of Caversham</u> The Vicar is currently reading Hilary Mantel's "The Mirror and the Light," the third and final novel in the trilogy about the life of Thomas Cromwell, chief civil servant of Henry the Eighth who dissolved the monasteries

and abolished pilgrimages to shrines. Amongst his abolition targets was Our Lady of Caversham near Reading, an act of vandalism mentioned in the novel. First mentioned in 1106 the shrine grew in popularity throughout the Middle Ages so her statue was given a silver coating and a gold crown. Catherine of Aragon, visited the shrine several times to pray for Divine help as her husband Henry pressured her for a divorce. In 1538 an emissary of Thomas Cromwell confiscated the statue and defaced the shrine. That same year the statues of Our Lady of Ipswich and of Walsingham were brought to London and publicly burnt at Chelsea. In the Marian year of 1958 the shrine of Our Lady of Caversham was rebuilt and established in the Catholic parish church of Our Lady and St Anne. The renewed shrine was solemnly blessed by the Archbishop of Birmingham that same year.

How fares the Diocesan Trust Board investments? The Dunedin Diocesan Trust Board investment committee and board met at the beginning of the week. It was gratifying to learn that the Growth Fund, which is heavily invested in overseas shares, having seen a sharp plunge in value has rallied remarkably and is up on where it was 2 years ago. The Income Fund, which is mostly invested in NZ and Australian shares, has been sailing in choppy seas with some companies no longer paying dividends. The DDTB sold off its tourism and aviation shares. However, local share markets are doing quite well given rising unemployment and a considerable slowing in the economy.

Communion consecration by zoom! It has been suggested by some within the diocese that we should follow the lead of some Baptist churches and ask parishioners confined within their home by the lockdown to put bread and wine in front of their laptops or computer screens, then to zoom or skype into their minister leading a communion service on line, and then to consider that as the minister recites the thanksgiving prayer over his or her bread and wine that this will have the effect of consecrating at long distance as it were the bread and wine in the home locations of parishioners. Our bishop and the bishops of Tikanga Pakeha have discounted this suggestion as one incompatible with Anglican Eucharistic practice and doctrine to the considerable relief of your Vicar. The whole point of posting a weekly celebration of the Mass on our website is so that parishioners can watch it at a time convenient to them and to make an act of spiritual communion (see prayer on front cover of the Pebble) when the celebrant takes communion. One can note in passing that the Baptist church has a somewhat flat earth and very low church theology of the Eucharist with low expectations of the ways in which Christ comes to the believer in the act of communion.
