There are those who are much exercised by the problem of evil and who find it a real stumbling block to belief in God. They want God to behave in the world's affairs just as the servants in this morning's gospel reading suggested. They want a vigilant God who is ceaselessly active in the doings of humankind, striking down malefactors, raising up the righteous and preventing bad things happening to good people.

We can quickly note two problems with this style of Divine operations. It lets human beings off the hook of being righteous and justice dispensing themselves. A hyper active God would make for a lazy people. And such a God would be the nightmare that atheist philosophers have been warning us about for some time – always breathing down our neck, keeping us under constant surveillance and preventing us from doing things that we consider legitimate enjoyments. Even if some of them are misguided, foolish and selfish how else would we learn from our mistakes and mature as moral agents? Crooks could not be converted and tyrants would not have the time and space to repent and reform. In short such a God would impose severe limits on human freedom.

<u>Ladies' Fellowship group</u> The Fellowship group will resume its normal cycle of meetings on Tuesday 25 August.

Monastery building in trouble As the ferry sails in to Wellington harbour one of the prominent buildings that stands out above Oriental Bay is St Gerard's monastery. Originally the home of the Redemptorist order it now houses a Catholic evangelization organisation. The building complex faces an \$11 million earthquake strengthening bill but its owners have only raised just over \$40,000 and time is running out. The Council is only prepared to offer limited financial assistance and suggests that the owners dispose of some of the buildings since the church itself is up to code and is the only building with a heritage listing. At our AGM next Sunday there will be a full briefing on where St Peter's is up to with its earthquake strengthening proposals.

Lambeth conference postponed again The world wide gathering of Anglican bishops convened by the Archbishop of Canterbury was to have occurred in the English summer this year. It had already been delayed by several years as Justin Welby tried to make thorough preparations to ensure its smooth operation and deft handling of potentially divisive issues. As the covid crisis broke it was decided to delay it to 2021. Now it has been put back again until 2022 because of the continuing and mounting covid crisis around the world. To some extent this has the effect of putting some of the Anglican Communion's hot button issues in deep freeze as major decisions on difficult issues are postponed. Lambeth's rival gathering of GAFCON bishops, which was to have occurred in Rwanda, has also been postponed. Recently GAFCON Australia had a nationwide zoom Service. Predictably Bishop Jay Behan of the New Zealand Fellowship of Confessing Anglicans had a speaking slot, but so also did the bishop of Nelson. This would not have thrilled the NZ Anglican bishops as it could be a straw in the wind as to which way Nelson will go in the end.
