Today's sermon is entitled "What Kind of Love?"

Paris calling The Revd Phillipe Toutain was a curate here at St Peters in the late 1970s. Sorbonne educated, handsome and charming, he caused many a St Peter's young female heart to flutter. After a spell as Vicar of Winton he then served in a variety of chaplaincy positions on the Indian Ocean Island of Mauritius. He then returned to Paris where he ministered to Malagasies at St Georges, which is part of the Anglican diocese of Europe. Living in retirement now and wheel chair bound as a result of Parkinson's he has been in frequent e mail contact with the Vicar in recent weeks to investigate the possibility of coming to live in Dunedin, a city he has many fond memories of.

The St John's College Trust Board When Bishop Selwyn founded St John's Theological College he also purchased a large swathe of land around the College. It was not until post Second World War Auckland encroached onto this land that it became valuable as a site of urban development. When the leases were renegotiated in the 1980s the revenues garnered by the St John's College Trust Board increased further making the College one of the most generously funded in the Anglican Communion. A decision to devolve some theological education on to the dioceses meant that from then on each diocesan ministry educator, and sometimes the children and young persons' worker, were funded from this source. Tikanga Maori was quick to realise the value of this funding resource and after the three Tikanga constitution came into existence its bishops were paid from the SJCTB. This was supposed to be a ten year transitional arrangement but as the years have gone by it has become a permanent arrangement. Increasingly the SJCTB has become the financial engine that drives more and more of the Province's activities. It has bailed out one of the financially failing Maori boarding schools and made a grant of \$50,000 towards the Dunedin diocese bishopric estate to enable the last episcopal election to proceed since a diocese must first guarantee that it can pay its incoming bishop. Synod papers reveal that this annual funding grant has now grown to \$65,000.
