<u>Slow and costly Cathedral rebuild</u> The recent 23 September ODT story entitled "Eight years to restore cathedral" confirmed what some have suspected for a while about the Christchurch Cathedral rebuild in terms of cost blowout and time overruns. A significant factor in persuading the

Christchurch diocesan synod to narrowly vote in favour of the rebuild was the government offer of a \$10 million cash contribution and a \$15 million loan, together with the city council pledging a \$10 million grant. Much had been made of the offers of wealthy donors to fund raise for the project and it was assumed that with the insurance money added in the 2017 estimate of \$104 million was an achievable financial target. Now with preliminary work underway it has become clear that it will cost more with a revised estimate becoming available sometime this month. Since the council and the government are unlikely in the post covid environment to come up with more cash the slack will have to be taken up by wealthy donors. The diocese is financially struggling since the mass breakaway of conservative evangelical parishes to form the Fellowship of Confessing Anglicans diocese. Given the intricate artisan work required to put humpty dumpty back together again it is now estimated at will take at least 8 years to complete the work and that is probably a conservative estimate. Meanwhile, just 3 blocks away on the banks of the Avon River, the Catholic diocese will build its contemporary design cathedral in far less time and at a fraction of the cost without civic or government handouts. If it turns out to be a beautiful building it may well attract mass tourism visits and their souvenir and donation income; cash that is sorely missed by the staff of the transitional cathedral.
