The woes of the Church of England The Church of England is facing a threefold crisis. Repeated covid lockdowns have led some of its regular churchgoers to lose the habit of churchgoing and have dried up the supply of regular money in the plate to finance parishes. Some parishes and dioceses are on the brink of financial crisis with some parish closures inevitable. Clergy layoffs have begun and will continue. Informed speculation has it that some dioceses will be amalgamated and that there will be a wholesale cull of bishops. The Independent Inquiry into Child Sex Abuse in England and Wales has published its reports with damming conclusions about the inadequate safeguarding procedures and unhelpful background culture of the C of E. This has led to a considerable loss of spiritual and moral respect for the church. An expensive programme of pay-outs to abuse survivors is under way. In an attempt to deal with the human sexuality conundrum the Living in Love and Faith materials have been produced, a set of print and visual offerings with often heart felt interviews with those on both sides of the debate. It is hoped that this will open up respectful conversations across the church that will persuade Anglicans to attend to others' points of view. Sensing, probably correctly, that LLF is intended to soften the C of E up to accept ecclesial gay marriage in the next few years conservative evangelicals have released The Beautiful Story, a professionally produced on line film that restates the church's traditional teaching on marriage and human sexuality and mentions the possibility of a mass exodus of conservative evangelicals. This has caused outrage amongst the Anglican LGBTQI constituency. In the event of a mass exodus the question would be how many of the church plants and other recent bold mission initiatives would the conservative evangelicals take with them since they specialise in such young person's recruitment tools and tactics.
