While there for the next year Jon will be assisting the ministry of Fr Michael Novotny at the parish of Christ the King, which is their original sending parish. Christ the King parish is affiliated to the Anglican Church of North America rather than the American Episcopal church. The Hicks are currently expecting their 7th child. Big decisions lie ahead for Fr Jonathan Hicks in a year's time. He has been asked to take a leading position at Kohimarama, the flagship theological college on Guadalcanal. He has also been asked to consider letting his name go forward for Bishop of Malaita in the upcoming episcopal election when Bishop Sam Sahu retires. Meanwhile they have asked our prayers for Fr Jack and Fr Alister, two Melanesian priests, who they are hopeful will shortly receive scholarships from the Solomons Island government to study at Nashotah House, the most Anglo-Catholic theological college in the Episcopal Church. Nashotah House is located in rural Wisconsin and is unusual in thriving at a time when many Episcopal theological colleges are struggling. Perhaps this is due in part to the fact that it has managed to straddle the divide between the Anglican Church of North America and the Episcopal Church and accept ordinands for training from both churches. Its conservatism can be gauged from the fact that the principal celebrant at the daily Masses celebrates with his back to the people. A gauge of the quality of its common life, worship, theological scholarship and of its disciplined search for holiness is the fact that the former Archbishop of Canterbury, the wonderful Michael Ramsey, chose to spend considerable periods of time there in his retirement and felt right at home at Nashotah House.
